1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

D. B. F. Dayanand College of Arts and Science, Solapur is affiliated to Punyashlok Ahilyadevi Holkar Solapur University, Solapur and therefore implements its prescribed curriculum. Faculties are members of various academic bodies of University and contribute for the implementation of University curriculum. The College executes following well-planned process for documentation for effective curriculum delivery:

- Annual Academic Calendar is prepared by IQAC every academic year. It mentions plan for academic, curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular activities, internal examinations, National holidays etc. All Departments and teachers ensure its implementation. Important notices, exam time tables, etc. are communicated to students.
- Departmental Annual Academic Calendar is also prepared reciprocating to College calendar. The time-table committee prepares theory and practical time tables for all programs. Each Department also prepares Departmental time-table.
- The Head of Department arranges a planning meeting with faculty members in every semester to distribute work load based on teacher's expertise.
- The college appoints well qualified, dedicated and experienced faculty. Individual teaching plans are prepared by teachers and communicated to students for effective completion of allotted work. They prepare study material, question bank and model question papers and provide to the students personally or through Digital Platforms.
- The faculty members regularly make adequate use of ICT along with black boards, Models and Charts for effective and student-centric teaching-learning process. Teachers are motivated to attend FDPs in order to update their academic knowledge and skills. The college provides well-equipped laboratories and classrooms to faculty and students.
- For effective delivery of curriculum Student seminars, Unit tests, surprise tests, workshops, special lectures, group discussions, Tutorials, Quiz competitions, paper presentations, educational tours, field trips and industrial visits are also arranged.
- The completion of Syllabus is monitored through teachers' reports, the student appraisal and feedback on individual teacher by students. The mentor-mentee scheme is conducted which enables students' feedback on the curricular issues. Online Student Satisfaction Survey is conducted. Feedback from other stake holders like parents, employers and teachers is also collected and analysed for proper implementation of curriculum.
- The college aims at outcome-based education as per the University CBCS pattern. To ensure this Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes have been prepared and displayed on the college website.
- Each faculty member maintains Academic diary for effective academic planning and implementation. Leaves for

academic, medical and personal reasons are given but alternative arrangements are made. Departmental meetings are held frequently in order to monitor, take feedback and plan for effective implementation of curriculum. • Along with the central library, Departmental Libraries enhance the quick and easy access to study resources. Library induction programs are frequently arranged. Internet facilities are made available in central library and each Department. • In order to evaluate the effective delivery of curriculum, result analysis of each subject is done at the end of every academic year.

We have collected responses from various stakeholders online using Google Forms. A high percentage of Alumni i.e. 74.14 percent pointed out that the syllabus reflects current content. 79.38 percent Alumni agreed that the syllabus is effective in developing independent thinking. 82.76 percent expressed that syllabus help you</p>

to build your career. 74.14 percent expressed that the syllabus is effective in developing written communication skills, 74.32 percent the syllabus they have learnt was job oriented, 87.93 percent opined that they have got adequate knowledge from the course, 75.86 percent opined that the course content satisfies the needs. Teachers' feedback regarding the curriculum too is taken and analyzed statistically. 91.67 percent pointed out that the syllabus reflects current content. 91.67 percent teachers opined that the course is effective in enhancing team working abilities. 88.89 percent teachers agreed that the syllabus is effective in developing independent thinking. 80.56 percent expressed that changes be considered for the next academic year. 94.44 percent teachers expressed that the syllabus is effective in developing written communication skills, 94.44 percent opined that students get adequate knowledge from the syllabus. 88.89 percent opined that the course content satisfies the needs of students. 80.07 percent pointed out that the syllabus reflects current content. 74.23 percent students opined that the course is effective in enhancing team working abilities. 84.88 percent students agreed that the syllabus is effective in developing independent thinking. 76.63 percent students expressed that the syllabus is effective in developing written communication skills, 82.82 percent opined that students get adequate knowledge from the course syllabus and 74.91 percent opined that the course content satisfies the needs of students. Also 81.63 percent of Parents pointed out that the syllabus reflects current content. 85.61 percent parents agreed that the syllabus is effective in developing independent thinking. 73.85 percent parents are of the opinion that there is need to include human values in current syllabus. 78.80 percent parents agreed that study tour or field visits are necessary. 86.57 percent opined that students get adequate knowledge from the course syllabus. A large number of parents i.e. 75.97 percent opined that the course content satisfies the needs of students. 70.67 percent parents are of the opinion that the syllabus reflects solutions for the local problems. 100 percent Employers pointed out that the syllabus reflects current content. 80 percent employers opined that the course is effective in enhancing team working abilities, 80 percent expressed that changes be considered for the next academic year. 100 percent employers agreed that study tour or field visits are essential. 80 percent employer expressed that the syllabus is effective in developing written communication skills. 100 percent are of the view that there a need of review of the syllabus, 80 percent employers are of the opinion that the syllabus reflects solutions for the local problems. On the basis of their suggestions, to enrich the curriculum, various activities conducted in college.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The mentor system in the college is run for student support. In consultation with the departmental faculty, head of department allocates at least 25-30 students to each faculty member. For all round development of students, the respective mentors arrange one to one interaction with their mentees and understand the progress in academics, sports, cultural activities, regularity, and active participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. In between the Principal, the mentors, and students [mentee] meet to discuss the problems, if any, of the students. Mentoring is done at various levels: 1. Academic: The mentor of the concern student group identifies advanced learners and slow learners mentee of a subject based on their performance in the internal assessment examinations and annual examinations and their active participation, involvement, performance in the classroom/practical hall. Accordingly, following strategies are adopted for advanced/slow learners by the mentors: • Provision of additional learning references. • Assignment on current and latest topics based on reference books, e-books, and Internet surfing. • Organization of Induction Programs, bridge courses, Remedial teaching, parent teacher meet. • Student Seminars on selected advanced reference topics. • Encouragement for Participation in quiz, debate and various competitive, co-curricular and extra-curricular competitions and guidance to excel in these. • Student Project Work based on practical work/survey data. • Motivation for industrial training, internship programs. • Special guidance is provided to do research and present paper in the State/ National/ International level conferences. • The Skill Development courses run by college inculcate job oriented skills. The mentee guide them to select the appropriate skill development course. • To bring the slow

learners in the main stream, the remedial coaching, one to one interactions are held. They are given assessments and previous year question papers to solve. Measures are taken to improve communicative skills.

2. Personal: The mentor also counsels on the health as well as stress issues. This interactive system provides the initial understanding about the student. The economic help, if needed, is also provided.

3. Career counseling: Mentors guide to choose the best suited career depending on the performance, overall personality of mentee. Dayanand Competitive Exams Guidance Centre in the college campus headed by Dr. R. V. Shinde runs various activities in this context. The mentee are encouraged to have additional training or internships to be taken.

4. Psychological counseling: The college has separate psychological counseling cell. Dr. S. D. Patankar, Head of Psychology Department runs psychological counseling cell of the college. The college has Professional counselor to help mentee at free of cost. The mentors try to be true friend, philosopher and a guide of mentee. The result of this mentor mentee system in college resulted in increased admissions, name and fame of college in the city. Also many students are benefitted in improving their academic as well as extra-curricular performance. Some introverted students also become talkative and tried to share their problems so that mentor can properly guide them.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The College strictly adheres to the rules and regulations of PAH Solapur University, Solapur for conducting evaluations. The University adopts Choice Based Credit System. Semester wise 15 marks for internal unit test and 15 marks for Home assignment i.e. total 30 marks for Internal and 70 marks for University exams are assigned. However, from academic year 2019-20 university has allotted 20 marks for college internal assessment and 80 marks for University assessment for first year UG and PG courses. The schedules of internal assessments are communicated to students and faculty in the beginning of the semester through institutional academic calendar reciprocal to the university academic calendar. A week in advance internal exam time table is displayed on the notice boards and digital platforms of the college. The internal test question paper is prepared by the respective faculty. The pattern of question paper is finalized under the guidance of HOD. Internal exam coordinator ensures smooth conduction of test and proper evaluation. The marks are entered in softcopy as well as in hard copy. The hard copy is kept in respective department however soft copy is sent via college coordinator to the university. The checked answer sheets are shown to the students. The doubts regarding evaluation and any other grievances are resolved by respective faculty and head of the department. The students participating in various extra-curricular activities are provided with special arrangement for Internal evaluation as per their scheduled convenience on recommendation of the respective in-charge.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The detailed academic calendar is prepared at the commencement of each academic year by IQAC. This includes the dates of re-opening, bridge course, orientation course, commencement of internal tests, commencement of semester examinations, important functions of the college and government, local and institutional holidays etc. The teaching plan is prepared by individual faculty under the guidance of concerned HOD. As per the academic calendar internal Assessment tests are conducted. The college has constituted an examination committee comprising of a senior teacher as coordinators and other teaching faculties as members to help coordinators for smooth conduct of examination. These committee coordinators prepare the time-tables and communicate to the students a week in advance. The faculty teaching respective course paper designs question papers. This is approved by heads of the department. In each semester for theory, one internal unit test of 15 marks [BSc/BA3, MSc/MA2] and 10 marks [BSc1/2, MSc/MA 1] is conducted and one home assignment for 15 marks [BSc/BA3, MSc/MA2] 10 marks [BSc/BA 1/2] is assigned to the students. For internal practical examination each science subject conducts one practical examination in the second term at departmental level. For this the batch wise time table is prepared at departmental level and displayed on notice boards one week in advance. For evaluation of theory papers one week is given to the faculty and evaluated papers are shown to students. Any grievances are resolved at H.O.D. level. Final marks are entered in soft format and sent to the university as per university scheduled time.

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

The institute has continued practice of decentralization and participative management at various levels during the year 2019-20. Dayanand educates for life and nation building is our vision. 'Decentralize through committees and work concurrently' is the formula followed by our management to plan and execute all activities. This process ensures involvement of all. Two practices are as below. 1. Honoring of Students (Annual Prize Distribution Function): Annual Prize Distribution Function is the prime and crown activity of college aiming to encourage potential for excellent achievements of students in academic, co-curricular, extracurricular, research and extension activities. Every year the institute plans two Prize distribution functions separately for Sports Achievements and Academic achievements. Its rehearsals are taken for smooth process and time management. 'Dayanandshri Award' is installed for development of all-round personality of the students. Responsibilities are assigned among total fourteen committees to make the function memorable. Distribution of work allows involvement of all staff members. The institution has maintained a great tradition of inviting inspirational personalities from various fields as chief guests. The Principal is authority to invite distinguished Chief Guests for the function. Most of the time these Chief Guests happen to be Alumni of the college working as Class One Officers or having social, political, intellectual or industrial repute. They share their memories of the college and motivate the gathering. Liberty to make decisions is given to the committees to make the function successful. Each committee includes one coordinator and a few staff members. Senior lady Professor Dr. Mrs. S. N. Deshpande has successfully coordinated this year's function. Every committee completes its work promptly. The charm of this function is a verity of Awards and Cultural Programme presenting heritage and culture. With the help of participative management functions like At Home, Seating Arrangement, Veda mantra, songs, Distribution of Certificates, honour of retired faculty and National anthem are conducted smoothly and gracefully with discipline. Curriculum Development	The faculty members in the college participate in the process of University curriculum development. They are contributing as members in Board of Studies, Faculty and Academic Council of PAH Solapur University, Solapur through which they are directly participate in the process of curriculum development. Some are appointed on the Syllabus Sub-Committees where they directly contribute. Others communicate their suggestions on curriculum to University. The college has designed 52 various Skill Development Certificate Courses in addition to traditional programmes. The feedback on syllabus is taken from students, teachers, parents and employers in order to improve the syllabus from time to time.
Teaching and Learning	Academic calendar, time tables and teaching plans are prepared. The ICT tools, Wi-Fi facility, e-Book, e-journal through N-List are provided. The e-content development and writing of reference books is promoted. The slow and advanced learners are identified and facilitated for improvement. Induction programme, bridge courses and remedial teaching are conducted to fill the gap in the knowledge and bring them to higher standard. Curricular and co-curricular activities like students seminars, industrial visit etc. are organized for acquiring additional knowledge. Institute conducts a student appraisal of teachers and feedback to evaluate and suggest measures for improvement in the teaching learning process.
Examination and Evaluation	The College conducts examination as

per norms and schedule. For college level internal evaluation semester wise Unit Test, Home Assignment, Project Report, Viva-Voce, Classroom Seminar, power point presentations and Group Discussion are conducted. Impartial evaluation work is done in college premises as well as CAP. In order to make the examination system full proof, various committees are appointed by the college during college and university examinations. These include Internal Squad, Discipline Committee, Invigilation Committee, Junior Supervision Allocation Committee etc. The faculty are involved in the process of evaluation as paper setters, examiners, moderators and grievances and redressal.

Research and Development

The institution has started 'Dayanand Research and Incubation Center' through which ideas, guidance and support is provided to the stakeholders. College provides Research Seed money to the faculty. Research committee motivates teachers and students to undertake Ph.D., MRPs and to participate in FDPs, Avishkar and other research activities. The institution offers appreciation letter to the researchers. The institution also promotes interdepartmental research activities. Academic and Research MOUs for sharing resources are done with some Renowned Institutions. Leaves and Liens are granted for research purpose. The college publishes DAV International Research Journal which encourages faculty to publish their quality research work.

The Bonafide Certificate and Transfer Certificate are prepared by the software in the admission office. The Transfer Certificate is issued in online mode.

Examination

The question papers are printed under CCTV surveillance. The marks of internal exam like Home Assignments, Unit Tests and Seminar are submitted to the University in online mode. The marks of practical exam are also sent in online mode to University. The receipts are generated in online mode. 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7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

Tree Plantation: In the year 2018-19, the college has purchased various saplings of Rs. 27,710/-. These samplings are planted in the college campus. The college has shown a commitment towards society and environment by maintaining greenery in the college campus. Water scarcity especially during summer season, tankers of water are purchased for green landscape. Drip irrigation system is adopted.

Solar Energy Generation Plant: The college has hostels for boys and girls. On the rooftop of girls hostel, solar thermal water heating system of capacity 500LPD has been installed. 100 LPD solar thermal water heating system saves 1250 kW of electrical energy per annum. In the following table, the savings of electrical energy achieved by college is presented. The College has installed a 10 kWp roof top Solar PV Plant at the Boys Hostel block. Total energy generated through this plant is 12,000 KWh per annum.

Rain Water Harvesting: The College has already implemented the Rain Water Harvesting Project. The College has installed Pipes from the terrace and the Rain water falling on the terrace is gathered and is fed to the Main Water Storage Tank.

Waste Management: All the organic litter of the college premises is being collected and dumped in the pits for decomposition and the preparation of vermicompost. It has been used for trees in the campus and even sell it out among employees of the college in the form of packets of 1 Kg.

Effluent treatment Plant : An effluent treatment plant is set to process the laboratory liquid waste. The college routinely practices the use of harvested rain water in the laboratories. The boy's hostel is provided with the solar thermal water heating unit of the capacity 500 LPD. The solar panels are installed on the roof of physics department. The electricity generated by these panels is credited to MSEB grid. Most of the students use bicycles and public transport. The campus has adequate RO systems for water supply.

Best Practice 1 Title of the Practice: Women- Architect of Society Objectives:

- To strengthen girl students by creating awareness about health, nutrition and hygiene

- To make girl students economically stable
- To explore career opportunities
- To develop a sense of social and civic responsibilities

The Context:

- Empowerment enables the person to gain insight and to make the person aware of the current situations. The push is needed for a woman in order to develop an attitude and perception for self respect and to know about her capability.
- In spite of her exhaustive work and input, woman is deprived of the earnings and get very meager amount against the work done.
- The college admits a large number of girl students. They come from various backgrounds. Many of them are the first learners from their family and from low socio-economic classes.
- "When you educate a girl you educate a nation", in this context, college constituted Women empowerment cell i.e. AARYA CELL. The practice: The college has constituted AARYA CELL in the academic year 2014 under the headship of

Principal, consisting female teaching faculties and representative girl students. ? Awareness programs: Various awareness programs and workshops in various formats like guest lecture, rallies, poster exhibitions regarding health, nutrition and hygiene, legal provisions, women trafficking and security, sexual harassment, gender sensitization, career opportunities, effects of tobacco chewing, emerging infectious diseases are conducted. Every year HB detection and HIV testing camps are organized and anemic girl students are counseled and treated by gynecologists. ? Education and Training: Women self competency is achieved and nourished by organizing guest lectures, workshops and training programs on computer literacy, competitive examination guidance, yoga training, self defense ? Ensuring safety: Women need safety from eve teasers, rapists, sexual harassment and violence. AARYA Cell trains the girl students for self defense, road safety and even for women trafficking. The college has appointed women security force for security and discipline in the campus. ? Motivational programs: Girl students are motivated to explore their hidden talent to participate in Avishkar research festival, food festival, rangoli, mehendi, drawing, elocution, essay writing, debate, singing and other cultural and art work competitions organized by our college and also other colleges. From academic year 2017-2018 the college is organizing various competitions viz. Dayanand Shree, Miss Dayanand, Dayanand Talent Search, Science Olympiad, Quiz competitions, Mahatma Anand Swami spelling competition, Naitik Pariksha (Dharmshiksha) examination and Yuvati Mohostav. Girl students are also motivated to participate in Startup India program. ? Socio-economic aid and educational aid: Economically weaker girl students are gifted with dress material. This year single girl child, single parent and member of farmer family with suicidal death were given scholarships. ? Grooming of overall personality: To develop overall personality of girl students, guest lectures and workshops on career guidance and job opportunity, life skill, spoken English are organized. ? Traditional day programs: To keep connected to our culture, values the teaching, non-teaching female staff and girl students of the college celebrate Dandiya Mohstav, Nagpanchami, Navratri Utstav, Bhondala. Evidence of success: The successful organization of the events itself is the evidence of success. Following are the outcomes: ? Some of the achievements of girl students and staff are as follows: 1. Ms Puja Katkar was selected as Golden Girl in Youth festival. 2. Ms. Ruchika Adam bagged Gold Medal at B.Sc. III in Microbiology from PAH SUS. 3. Ms. Gouravi Santosh Yerankollu qualified SET examination in Geology. 4. Ms. Puja Channa of Mathematics department qualified CSIR NET Exam with 93 all India rank 5. Ms. Surabhi Bhayya, NSS cadet won first prize in Rangoli competition second prize in elocution competition held by Solapur municipality. 6. Dr. Mrs. Rakhi Gavali, Assistant Professor of Chemistry is granted two process patents. 7. Mrs. N.R. Damle of microbiology department is awarded with Ph.D. degree. 8. Following girl students are working as Covid Worriers 1. Ms. Aafrin Nigewan, M.Sc.-II[Microbiology] 2.Ms. Shruti Chari ,M.Sc.-II[Microbiology] 3.Ms. Farzana Shaikh ,M.Sc.-II[Microbiology] 4.Ms.ReetaMeshram[Zoology] ? Problems Encountered ? Overlapping of few theory lectures and practical sessions. ? Social view towards the women still is biased ? Reluctance of girl students to stay for long time in college campus. ? Parents of girl students have a fear of violence and insecurity. ? Resources required ? Strengthening the girl students by more involvement of NGO, funding agencies, charity trusts. ? Raising public awareness through voluntary organizations. ? Budgetary provision by University to run or implement various activities ? Parental participation and contribution in higher education policy. ? Stipend to girl students especially pursuing higher education like PG and Ph.D. courses. BEST PRACTICE: 2 Title of the Practice: Selfless help to the deserved. Objectives: • To help financially the deserving students of the college to meet their academic expenses to prevent them from discontinuation of studies. • To support all the topper students with a cash prize without any discrimination of caste, creed or gender. • To financially support Divyangjan

students of the college. • To help students without parents and students with single parents. • To inculcate the values of sense of social responsibility and generosity among the students. The context: The students joining college are mostly from rural areas from nearby villages of Solapur. Some students are from economically poor background. There are few students whose parents committed suicide as burden of agricultural loans, Lack of rainfall etc. It was noticed that many students have single parent mostly only mother or lost both the parents. Their parents are unable to provide them enough financial support for education. In such situation sending their children for higher education becomes day dream. With the inspiration of the institution's legacy student aid fund is given to industrious students who are unable to pay the fees and to meet educational expenses. The practice: A Scholarship committee headed by the Principal comprising of IQAC Co-coordinator and about 10 members has been constituted. It was decided to extend the scholarship benefit to the deserving students who do not have the advantage of government or any other scholarships. The committee adheres to the rules in selecting the students unbiased. The sponsors deposited money so that interest is given as scholarship. Few sponsors give money for scholarships year wise. The notice for the scholarships is published on Dayanand App, College notice boards and promoted by teachers through mentor-mentee scheme. The college scrutinizes the applications received from aspirants for the scholarships. Faculty members also donate generously along with the Alumni. The criteria for the scholarships were decided and named accordingly as follows: • Mahatma Hansraj Merit Scholarship for Topper students in B.Sc.-I,II,III, B.A-I,II,III, B.Sc.-ECS-I,II,III (Nine scholarships) funded by our esteemed Alumni Mr. Kishor Chandak. • Shri Vishnu Yeshwant Gaikwad scholarship is given for Divyangjan students (seven scholarships) donated by our faculty Mr. Shriganesh Gaikwad. • Smt. Kamalabai Shrivallabh Chandak Scholarship to students who lost both the parents (eleven scholarships) is funded by Mr. Kishor Chandak. • Shri. Shrivallabh Lonkaran Chandak Scholarship is delivered to students who have single parent (three scholarships) is also funded by Mr. Kishor Chandak. • Shri Mahesh Mahadeo Jagdale Scholarship is given to students who have single parent (ten scholarships) is funded by Alumni Dr. Mahadeo Asabe. • Mrs. Manorama Jagdish Naik Scholarship was given to students who have single parent (nine scholarships) by Shri Rama Jagdish Mahila Multipurpose Society. • Mr. Bhagiradhi Kabraji has sponsored 5 scholarships of total amount 10000/- is started from 2019-20. • Mr. Popat Patil scholarship of amount 6000/- is given for six single parent students. • Dr. G.S. Shahane faculty of our college donated generously for five single parent children an amount of Rs.5000/- from 2019-20. • Alumni and faculty Dr. Mrs. N.R. Damale funded scholarship for five single parent students an amount of Rs.5000/-.She also sponsored cash prize in the name of her father to the topper in Microbiology. • Faculty of the college Dr. S.R. 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

Maharshi Dayanand Saraswati, one of the pioneering figures in the Indian history who initiated social reforms in pre-independence India, started a movement known as Arya Samaj and made an appeal to people with an awakening call 'Back to Vedas'. The term 'Veda' means 'to know'. Literally, it refers to knowledge. Knowledge inspires the curious ones to search for truth and the truth is not bound to rituals. According to Dayanand Saraswati, there is no need of idol worship in the path of true knowledge. Therefore, there is no idol worship in the college campus. However, the college has preserved the idols of various Gods and Goddesses and great personalities from different ancient periods of Indian history in the museum to showcase the ideal types of living from the glorious past of India. The college has raised for this purpose a special museum which is known as the Historical and Cultural Heritage Preservation Center. The idols in the museum represent the very base of life and life-style of its contemporary society. While appealing for 'Back to Veda', Maharshi Dayanand Saraswati laid emphasis on the importance of Vedic Havan or Yagya (Yadnya). He propagated and regularized Vedic Havan systematically molded in the Arya Samajist tradition. The practice of Havan symbolizes the formless God-worship. In the Havan, the Fire is ignited. The Fire itself being a spark of the divine, is the mediator between Formless God and Human beings. The Fire accepts everything which is offered by the devotee or performer as 'sacrificial' and takes it to God. This is a faith of all Aryans. The college organizes Hom-Havan Program on special occasions on the college campus. It is attended by the staff and desirous students. The college has raised a separate site for performing Vedic Havan. The college also organizes special guest lectures of eminent persons to impart the knowledge of Vedic culture and Arya Samajist Tradition. Acharya Anand Purusharthi from Hoshingabad, Madhya Pradesh was invited by the College to deliver a lecture on 'Man Making Education and Culture' on 5th December, 2019. The college observes the Vedic principles of 'Truth' 'Non- Violence', 'Live and Let Live' through various programs. Every year the college conducts 'Naitik Shiksha Pariksha' and 'Dharma Shiksha Pariksha' to inculcate moral and ethical values among students. After the conduct of the examinations, the topper students are awarded with certificates and cash prizes. This moral education is made available to all desirous students on the campus. The moral education imparted to the students aims to maintain morality, to build the social character of a person and thereby developing an ideal moral society.
